Sara Blair is Patricia S. Yaeger Collegiate Professor of English and faculty associate of American Culture and Judaic Studies. Her publications include *How the Other Half Looks: The Lower East Side and the Afterlives of Images* (Princeton University Press), *Harlem Crossroads: Black Writers and the Photograph in the Twentieth Century* (Princeton University Press), *Remaking Reality: U.S. Documentary Culture after 1945*, co-edited with Joseph Entin and Franny Nudelman (University of North Carolina Press), *Jewish in America, co-edited with Jonathan Freedman* (University of Michigan Press, 2004), as well as essays in such venues as American Literary History, Images, PMLA, ELH, The Cambridge Companion to Alfred Hitchcock, and The Oxford Handbook of Global Modernisms.
